

2022 New South Wales Graduate Medal

The Policy Document Defining Dwelling and Domestic Formalities 2022

Calum York, Hannah Clifton and Raphael Newell University of Technology Sydney This project addresses the urgent need of delivering better housing across a broader range of typologies and scales within the well serviced existing urban fabric of the city.


The project identifies housing parameters not currently met by existing policy and looks to address housing shortfall by providing flexibility in typology to ensure that delivered housing is capable of meeting contemporary and future residents needs. By identifying a range of specific urban sites, the students tested their research and hypothesis through the design of site-specific buildings to increase sleeping density rather than the typical built form density response.

The challenge of addressing the seemingly mundane issue of housing should never be underestimated. Only because of creative thinking that challenges assumed and established norms – like that proposed by the students, will we ever come close to delivering the level of equity in our built housing stock that is required.

Stayin' Alive

Natalie Wing Sum Ho University of New South Wales By using her lived experience Natalie was able to establish a brief that considered the potential for architectural program to help create connections in her community. This project suggested the establishment of 'free space' on a university campus – released of academic programming, but available to fertilise the creative and community minds of students.

Located at an elbow junction of the university built form grid, the project aims to make space for both large collections of people and individual endeavour. Using a slab and tower typology the project establishes a strong urban street edge, allowing the traditional campus to extend and hold the public domain, while the verticality of the tower creates a marker building to announce the buildings importance. The freshness of simple creative thinking and well considered urban edges is delightful.

Gaia's Labyrinth

Lauren Jewell University of Technology Sydney This poetic project aims to readjust our thinking around the challenge of sustainability. Taking a monastic religious approach, the project asks us to consider sustainability from a spirituality perspective, by placing us within a specific and orchestrated architectural environment, allowing us to question the capacity of humanity to 'believe'. With beautiful drawings and an engaged narrative this is a project based on a strategy of experience aiming to move the participant to a new mindset and outlook.

Architecture, Liberation, and the Pursuit of Eros



With a beautiful set of drawings and models the project is both programmatically and physically seductive, asking us to consider ourselves differently.





Its bold material expression celebrates structure through exposed steel framing and rammed earth, drawing clear contrast with the site, its foundations sitting proud of the low water line. Here, the opposing forces of natural and man-made are given equal billing.

The architecture is contextualised by a compelling analytical framework and shows a breadth of understanding to be commended for undergraduate studies, clearly communicated through high quality drawing and imagery tied together though a memorable graphic language.

The Infrastructural

Justin Saliba Western Sydney University The Infrastructural proposes an innovative integration of landscape and architecture to sustainably remediate and re-imagine the contaminated Western Sydney suburb of Camellia. The site was transformed from its current abandoned and unusable state, into a new precinct focused on the infrastructure required for sustainable industries. This was achieved through a comprehensive staged process beginning with large scale planting of decontaminating plant species.

The re-imagined Camellia precinct is centred around a concrete recycling plant, public open spaces, and education facilities with large scale infrastructure systems; The project breaks down the boundaries of urban design and allows the public to come face to face with the requirements of living and building in a sustainable way.



Commendation 2022 New South Wales Undergraduate Medal

A new powerhouse for the makers

Sujin Kim, Grace Borger and Kaitlyn Demol University of Technology Sydney 'A New Powerhouse for the Makers' re-interprets what defines museums, and how it can become the stage for Makers, rather than just the object. The playful and engaging design tackles the large Sydney Powerhouse Museum site with a single and powerful idea, where both Makers and making are the exhibit. An interweaving network of moving platforms allow the audience to engage with and follow the Makers through the stages of their process; previously hidden behind closed doors.

Considered architectural moments are created through this network, demonstrating an attention to audience experience, as they move through the site. The depth of examination evident in this body of work extends an experimental idea into the real world of architecture and space making.

The Precinct

Benjamin Selig University of New South Wales 'The Precinct' interrogates the role of 'the library' typology within the regional community of Broken Hill. The rigour of research into both the urban and social framework is made clear through the realisation of the architecture and its effect on human interaction and experience.

Innovative consideration of the materiality and its implications on thermal comfort creates an architectural resolution that is visually striking and appropriate to the local climate.

The library is an ever-evolving piece of public infrastructure within our cities and towns. The Precinct aims to accommodate a range of needs, transitioning from meeting place, educational facility, emergency shelter, and cultural centre, all with the local community as agents in each transition.

Allegory of the Museum of Fiction



'Allegory of the Museum of Fiction' takes us on a journey that traces the complete evolution of an architectural concept from its historical context, to its reinterpretation, to its architectural realisation, and ultimately to its abandonment and extinction. The process is boldly and unconventionally presented through a manifesto that challenges conventional thinking and communicates the design process via storytelling, resulting in a narrative that is relatable and accessible to a broad audience. With architecture this is important.

Effective communication can be uncomfortable. It can move you to question your own beliefs, but it can persuade you to see things from a different perspective. Kevin's manifesto engages the reader in questioning what is history and how it is represented. In today's world, where history and facts are increasingly challenged, politicised, and reinterpreted, this is particularly relevant.

The portfolio has an artistic quality to it with an historical feel that is graphically powerful. The emotive imagery is predominantly black and white and is dark and moody, but it is punctuated with colour and touches of humour. Along with Kevin's verbal presentation, it is a body of work that is beautifully communicated with a high level of confidence and conviction.

Stayin' Alive

Natalie Wing Sum Ho University of New South Wales 'Stayin' Alive' is a deeply considered and comprehensive body of work that very clearly communicates the analysis, process and principles that inform the design response.

The design report is punchy and playful with the combination of coloured freehand graphics and simple descriptive text communicating the series of concepts and ideas in a most concise and legible way. These techniques allow the reader to very easily understand the key design drivers without having to dig deeply.

As architects, it is a valuable skill to be able to articulate our ideas as clearly and succinctly as Natalie has done in her beautifully constructed submission.

build back better; urban resilience for the township of Lismore

Carmelo Nastasi The University of Sydney 'Build Back Better' considers confronting elements of climate change by exploring opportunities for a progressive rather than reactive design response to the issues of excessive rainfall and flooding in Lismore.

The three phase process of Research, Prototyping and Detailed Design of the proposed Flood Research Facility is clearly and methodically articulated, while the design portfolio is beautifully presented with emotive graphics, photography, imagery and architectural models that illustrate the deep thought that has gone into the submission and the messages it seeks to communicate.

'Wambuul Birthplace' articulately considers the stages of childbirth with a richly informed connection to the subject through family ties. The study methodically explores the role architecture can play in rethinking the birthing suite from an institutionalised process-driven model to a deeply personal, place-based response that considers childbirth holistically from the time of conception, through to birth and beyond.

The design process is clearly and succinctly presented with deep and intimate analysis of the site and subject matter resulting in a sensitively considered design response that is communicated beautifully both visually and verbally.

Revive 75

Tyla Venish University of New South Wales With housing affordability being a prominent issue impacting the nation and the future generations of Australia, 'Revive 75' proposes an alternative housing model that challenges traditional ideas of how we dwell within our cities.

Tyla's project looks at a Built-To-Rent development that addresses this, while incorporating a simple yet sophisticated series of sustainability interventions that rejuvenates a contaminated site of the Sydney suburb of St. Peters.

Through a considered system of consumption, redirection of waste, and the collection of solar energy and natural resources, 'Revive 75' looks to generate a circular economy that benefits both residents and neighbouring communities.

The project is a wonderful solution in how developments have potential to address key issues of housing affordability, while simultaneously creating a machine that functions to heal our communities and the environment.

The Policy Document Defining Dwelling and Domestic Formalities 2022

Calum York, Hannah Clifton and Raphael Newell University of Technology Sydney 'The Policy Document Defining Dwelling and Domestic Formalities 2022' interrogates current building codes and design guides to explore an alternative approach to urban domesticity, providing flexibility on multiple scales of inhabitation.

The PDDDDF is a comprehensive technical document that highlights ways in which domestic living exists beyond standardisation, becoming a tool that is formatted to be constantly reviewed and updated.

The project shows the students' thorough understanding of standards that dictate Australia's housing design, while giving us a glimpse of the multiplicity of opportunities in how we can dwell in our growing cities.

Corey Arkins, Josef Sfara and Yves Trinajstic University of Technology Sydney 'Systrum' looks to redevelop Sydney's Powerhouse Museum into a creative workplace and social condenser, while creating a site traversal between the suburbs of Ultimo and Haymarket.

The Jury commends the students' in undertaking a project on both a difficult site and a complex existing building of that scale. The students' ambitious, yet refreshing, approach in integrating mechanical and electrical systems into the project was also admired by the Jury, which seeks to uplift existing buildings to accommodate a new generation of future occupants.

build back better; urban resilience for the township of Lismore

Carmelo Nastasi Faculty of Architecture University of Sydney Global warming is challenging our resilience. We can no longer 'wait and see', nor simply shift our settlements to places that won't be impacted – ours is a continent of drought and flooding rains, leading to increases in bush fire and flooding.

Architecture must play a role in creating capacity for our communities to respond to expanding natural disasters of increased intensity. Rather than aiming to design out the challenges presented by this new normal, we need to design them in – to work out how to live with greater fluctuation.

Carmelo's proposal, set in Lismore, offers a view into a new normal, where communities through the employment of better architectural systems can respond and adapt to flooding. His travel proposal, to learn from those who consistently respond to flood offers an opportunity to build confidence, approaching flooding more laterally, as a natural and regular occurrence to be designed for.

As a jury we were excited by Carmelo's passion for the challenge and his connection to the community through lived research. We look forward to seeing how grass roots community engagement and collaboration may better prepare our communities for change.

Retrofitting for Reinvention

Hannah Hill-Wade and Tom Matthews Faculty of Architecture, University of Sydney Retrofitting for Reinvention' by Hannah Hill-Wade and Tom Matthews seeks to investigate the role of technical heritage within our cities and align past stories of technical innovation and economic progress with present understandings of public space. In taking the derelict glebe island, conducting detailed research and sensitively inserting a platform to enable a new generation to interact and appreciate the historic relevance of this structure in the development of transport infrastructure in Sydney, Hannah and Tom have proposed a valuable response to many of the current unloved infrastructure elements that are within our cities and regional areas.

The jury were impressed by the team's sophisticated understanding of urban design across both macro and micro scales.






