A role with purpose

Nationally Elected Councillors are appointed to National Council to represent member interests, to lend expertise and knowledge and assist in the implementation of Institute initiatives, while supporting the National President to advance the architectural profession's interests. Importantly the purpose of this role is to represent the broad membership base – free of Chapter boundaries.

Primary Objectives:

- To create alignment between strategic priorities of National Council and the actions of National Committees within an agreed Business Plan.
- Advocate for the priorities of National Council and the needs of Committees within a particular policy and advocacy stream: Learning, Practice or Culture.
- Ensure effective member engagement and value delivery
- Support the National President in initiatives to better the profession and broaden impact

- Chapter industry partners and government officials

What you'll be doing

Strategic Policy and Advocacy Streams Leadership

- Act as Co-advocate for one of the Institute's Policy and Advocacy streams: Learning, Practice, Culture. The role of Co-advocate is to play a bridging role, acting as both a representative of National Council to Committees within a particular stream and advocate of these committees needs to National Council.
- Translate national strategic initiatives and yearly Business Plan into actionable programs in consultation with National Committee Chair's .
- Provide detailed perspective and evidence-based input to national policy development, particularly on Committee regulatory and industry matters
- Drive advocacy campaigns that amplify the Institute's national agenda while addressing Committee priorities.
- Be a member of at least one of the institute National Committees and facilitate effective communication between the committee and the National Council

Governance

- Actively participate in National Council meetings, providing well-researched insights and contributing to strategic discussions
 - Drive effectiveness of assigned National Council committees through regular attendance, thorough preparation, and meaningful contribution
 - Support the National President by providing governance insights and maintaining strong local compliance standards

Member engagement

- Lead Committee engagement strategy through structured consultation programs, ensuring member voice is effectively represented at national level
- Communicate NC decisions to your Policy and Advocacy Stream Committees.
- Promote and support the agreed National position to unify members
- Engage with the institute's systematic feedback mechanisms and ensure they are utilized for capturing member insights and concerns, to achieve timely response and action
- Support and advise on creation of targeted engagement programs for different member segments (emerging, established, senior practitioners)
- Support implementation of national professional standards at Committee Level

Industry liaison and engagement

- Help drive industry engagement through structured communication programs and regular consultation

- Current RAIA financial membership
- Election by relevant members following the relevant voting process
- Current knowledge of relevant architectural practice and standards, trends and issues related to the profession
- considerable and proven experience (circa 5 years' or more) experience in architectural practice or industry
- Previous role in RAIA Chapters or Committees preferred; track record of successful board or committee participation in a professional context is ideal
