Significant as an example of the Sydney School of architecture, and an advanced residential design in Canberra. Well sited and innovatively designed to give privacy, a good aspect and take advantage of a view over the city. The house is introverted in character, with only one window facing the street and a wall screening the carport. Designed on several levels the plan defines and reinforces the separate functions and requirements of the family. This definition is strengthened by the use of internal courtyards, which also give greater privacy. The design of the house is strong and bold, and the white brick facade to the north and south is simply articulated by stained timber posts and windows. The house was awarded the 1965 Canberra Medallion. Description Significantly sited and designed to give privacy a good aspect, and take advantage of a view over the city. The house is introverted in character, with only one window facing the street and a wall screening the carport. The house is designed on several levels which relate to the fall of the site, and give definition in plans to distinct areas of the house. Condition and Integrity Excellent.
