Statement of Significance

A house erected for the Quartermaster of the Royal Military College, which has strong associations with the development of the college, as one of its first permanent residences. It has had continuous residential use.

The house is architecturally significant as a fine example of an early 20th century military officer's residence in near original condition and attractively landscaped, which makes a significant contribution to the special character of the oldest portion of the Duntroon campus.

Description

Hiscock House is a single-storey house, "H" shaped in plan, with verandahs on two sides, one projecting in a semi-octagonal shape and the other having access to the kitchen. It contains six rooms arranged around a central hallway, with a back hall to the kitchen, pantry, laundry and bathroom. Other features of this house are a bay window, a folded-rib decking roof with wide eaves and exposed rafters, and roughcast concrete-block walls.

The house's floor area being somewhat larger than others at Duntroon and the choice of masonry rather than timber for the walls are commensurate with the Quartermaster's high ranking.

The Federation Free Style design of the house has some similarities with those of the Commandant's house and Senior Officers' houses in Parnell Road, particularly in having the same degree of asymmetry, windows, roof form and roughcast walls, but it has no other attributes of the style. 1

Condition and Integrity

Good condition with high integrity.

Background/History

This residence was completed in 1912 and first occupied by Honorary Lieutenant C. Hiscock, the Quartermaster of the Royal Military College. It has had continuous use as a residence ²
